Enacted in 2012, the America Invents Act (AIA) made sweeping changes to patent prosecution and litigation in the United States. In particular, inter partes reviews (IPRs) added a new dimension to patent litigation, often determining whether a patent lives or dies. And IPRs themselves are changing. The Supreme Court recently found that while IPRs themselves are constitutional, the Patent Office has been implementing them all wrong. A basic understanding of IPRs is essential for anyone involved in R&D, patents, or sales, or who works for a company that might be sued for patent infringement—in other words, everyone.
